

## Winners in village elections

### Broken machines in Rockville Centre briefly raise worries but after a delay vote goes on; elsewhere, incumbents mostly fare well

Two voting machine mishaps in Rockville Centre offered the only snags yesterday in village elections in Nassau and Suffolk counties.

Initially, trustee candidates Andrew Karamouzis and Jeanne Mulry, who said a large part of their support base was located in the districts where the machines broke down, worried the results would be affected. But both comfortably won the two seats.

The machines, which were in Rockville Centre's south side, forced a more-than-one-hour delay in morning voting at Defenders Firehouse and an almost-two-hour delay in afternoon voting at Riverside Elementary School.

Village officials resorted to paper ballots, using another district's machine, and asking voters to come back later.

Karamouzis and Mulry, both running on The Residents' Voice Party line, were concerned about losing votes, especially in an area they viewed as their stronghold. They were opposed by incumbent trustee Gregory Rinn on the Concerned Citizens line and Edward Oppenheimer on the Home Rule Party line.

The village administrator, Ronald Wasson, said he was confident that most everyone who wanted to vote did.
